I recently had occasion to update a group of generous donors about COLA.

I told them about our alumni, who continue to do amazing things, including teaching in France, Kazakistan, China, Indonesia, Turkey, Honduras, Columbia and Slovakia; helping youth from the Montgomery County Juvenile justice program create murals; making films for Netflix; winning Tonys, Oscars, and Emmys; creating a nonprofit that helps disadvantaged women start companies; serving as lead brewer at Carillon Brewing Company; designing exhibits at the National AfroAmerican Museum; volunteering at vaccination clinics; managing air force contracts; launching a community theatre company for young people of color; starting successful businesses; attending graduate school in various fields; and of course, rising to the top of their chosen professions.



I reminded them that COLA continues to focus on highlighting the importance of the liberal arts as providers of essential workplace skills. Employers list specific skills as crucial to the workforce of tomorrow and most likely to lead to advancement: written and verbal communication, critical thinking and problem solving, the ability to work in teams, do research and understand data, and an appreciation of our multicultural world. That is what we do in this college.

I mentioned that COVID has given existing educational practices a good shakeup. We can either resist change, or we can see opportunity.

I am very proud to say that in COLA we understand that the future of higher education across the country and in the region is for interdisciplinary programs, experiential learning and stackable credentials. When you unpack all that higher education lingo, you get flexible programs that recognize that all students don't go to school full time for 4 years straight, and may want stepping stones to a degree made up of a series of credentials. We can do that. Students may have more than one interest and don't want to be stuck in a single academic lane. We can provide flexibility to study some of this and some of that and still arrive at the finish line. They want real world experience along with their degree, and evidence to offer to employers that they're ready for the workforce. We excel at that.

In fact, the whole college is involved in robust discussions about how we must change to lead higher education in the liberal arts in a way that is cost effective, takes advantage of existing resources, provides in-demand skills, and is energizing. By this time next year I'm hoping we will be organized into fewer units that bring together complimentary skills in new ways to serve our students. It's demanding and exciting work. Stay tuned.


