Our first faculty spotlight is on **Sharon Lynette Jones** in English, who had a
PDL to work on research on scholar,
philosopher, and civil rights activist
Angela Y. Davis. Lynette is the editor of *Conversations with Angela Davis*,
submitted to the University Press of
Mississippi in December 2018. She also
worked on a second book project *Resisting Injustice: Contemporary Views on Angela Davis*, an edited
volume of essays examining Davis in
multidisciplinary contexts from
international and/or transnational
perspectives.

In addition, Lynette presented on Davis in multiple venues, including Emory University, the University of North Carolina Asheville, Spelman College, the University of California San Diego, Ball State University, and Earlham College. For her work, Lynette received the Ford-Turpin Distinguished Achievement Award on October 24, 2019 at Morgan State University. The photo shows Lynette with Davis at Emory University

Fantastic news from Motion Pictures: faculty member emerita Julia Reichert and alumnus and former professor Steven Bognar received an Academy Award nomination for their film American Factory. American Factory was the first Netflix film sponsored by Michelle and Barak Obama's Higher Ground production company, and former president Obama tweeted his support for the film.
