

# Message from the Coordinator: Dr. Lee Hannah

I had a great summer. My first <u>book</u> was published with New York University Press in July. I was fortunate enough to have the university write a <u>story</u> about it too. I'm working on a second book on the same topic of marijuana policy. As a political scientist, I have had several opportunities to promote the book and to comment on broader national politics.

Speaking of, I am very excited to be teaching a class on **Campaigns and Elections (PLS 4030)**. If you are still looking for a class, this class works as an upper-level political science class. It is also an integrated writing course. I am excited about one activity in this class in particular. We are going to design and field a survey of Wright State students to better understand political opinions at the university. You may see my class out in September, inviting students to take the survey. Students will learn to conduct some basic political analysis in Excel and then write up reports on aspects of the election and survey that they are interested in. I think the project could be modified for a high school government class too. There is still space in this class, and it fulfills an upper-level political science credit.

At the same time, I am passionate about students being active voters at minimum. While we are out surveying students, we will also have voter registration forms and absentee ballot applications. If you are not registered to vote or need help filling out an absentee ballot, please reach out to me.

#### WHAT I'M READING:

I just picked up *How to Raise a Citizen* (*And why it's up to you to do it*) by Lindsey Cormack. Lindsey is a political scientist and professor at Stevens Institute of Technology in New Jersey. I've had the opportunity to follow her career and even write with her in recent years.

Lindsey is also a mother and realized that, while she's read countless parenting books on all sorts of topics, there wasn't much out there on "nurturing active, engaged citizens for a flourishing democracy." In fact, she found that many parents don't even know where to start and that "our institutions play a big game of hot potato on who is meant to teach civics to our kids." As a result, she describes a situation that I can certainly identify with.

In my interaction with students, I have often witnessed a gap in political understanding and civic engagement. These bright minds, on the cusp of full adulthood, often find themselves at a loss when it comes to deciphering the intricate maze of politics and government functioning. And not only are they lost, in feeling adrift they become turned off by the whole system.

Hopefully, many of you will teach government classes and find a way to empower students to better understand how government works and to feel like they can make a difference. But there are also numerous challenges that Cormack's book does an excellent job of unpacking – everything from pressure from parents to pressure on school boards.

The book is comprehensive with data about Americans' civic knowledge and information about how civics are taught in different states and grades. The book also includes a framework for discussing politics. While the audience for this section is primarily parents, I think you would be able to find some insights into engaging the topic. I could see this as a book that you keep on your bookshelf and occasionally recommend during a parent-teacher conference.




#### WHAT I'M LISTENING TO:

I teach about elections and I occasionally write about elections. Not surprisingly, even in my free time, I like to follow elections. The podcast, <u>American Elections: Wicked Game</u>, has an episode on each election. It is well-researched and interesting. The episodes were recorded in 2020 but they have been rereleasing a week since last year.

We've pulled all the old episodes down and beginning November 7th, will be re-publishing them every week. Why? For the same reason we did it the first time four years ago: to prove that presidential politics has always been abysmal, has never matched this nation's promise, and that, once you understand that, today's chaos is easier to take.

I wouldn't put it quite that cynically, but it is worth considering that we might look at past elections through rose-colored glasses. These podcasts do an excellent job of providing the broader historical and political context and are a good listen for any future history or government teacher.



#### NCCJ TEEN SUMMIT FACILITATOR FAQ

- 1. What are the goals of the Teen Summit?
- The primary goals are to equip students with skills to enhance the climate of their schools and empower them to contribute to building more inclusive communities.
- 2. Who are the participants?
  - High school students from over 20 schools in Greater Dayton (about 300 students) will be attending the event and separated into groups of (8).
- 3. What is the role of a facilitator at the Teen Summit?
  - Facilitators play a crucial role in guiding small group activities and discussions.
     They help create a safe and inclusive environment for students to share their thoughts and experiences.
- 4. Will meals be provided during the event?
  - Yes, attendees and facilitators will be provided with lunch while they engage in DEI activities.
- 5. Is attendance to facilitator orientation required?
  - Yes, attendance to (1) of the two orientations is required as it will provide key insights to the curriculum and facilitator best practices.
- 6. When is facilitator orientation?
  - Dates for orientation will be announced in late May, 2024.
- 6. Are there resources provided for facilitators?
  - Yes, NCCJ provides facilitators with all resources and materials to assist them in leading activities and discussions.
- 8. How can facilitators support the overall goals of the Teen Summit?
  - By fostering a positive and inclusive atmosphere, facilitating meaningful discussions, and encouraging students to apply their learnings in their respective schools and communities.
- 9. Can I attend part of the Teen Summit?
  - No, if you register to be a facilitator, your presence is required for the full duration of the event in order to maintain safe spaces for the students.
  - Volunteer setup options are available to set up the event space.
